Culture in Alice Springs is strong and it plays a big part in the lifestyle and the way that children learn here. Taking this on board and absorbing the experiences of those around you is sure to enhance your capacity to build relevant and valuable lessons.

AN URBAN ENVIRONMENT IN THE MIDDLE OF THE DESERT

There are not many places in the world that you can compare to Alice Springs. It is a town that has a lot of layers and facets, the more you dig, the more you uncover, it's never ending.

While Alice Springs might be located in the middle of nowhere (or we like to say, the middle of everywhere!), it is ultimately a very urban environment. It may feel like you are moving into remote teaching, and location wise, perhaps you are. However, in terms of the methods and curriculum you'll be using and the place you'll be living, Alice is about as urban as they come.

Alice Springs is a town of around 25,000 people with around 4,300 being Indigenous. It is a town that is made up of people from all over the country and the world. Most people you talk to will have moved here from a major city, usually for work. Some will have come for a six month placement and decided to stay on because they've enjoyed the challenge of the work and the contrast of the lifestyle. There is a mixture of cultures and life experiences in Alice Springs that is a lot more concentrated than many other places. This town is absolutely full of interesting people doing interesting things.

There are all the major franchise stores for food, cars, hardware, homewares. It would be far too boring for us to list them all here, so we won't. The cost of living is slightly higher in Alice because things have a long way to come. However, wages are usually higher here too to compensate for this. You can find every range of sports team or hobby group here. There is a huge and healthy arts scene in Alice, with events happening on constant rotation. There really is no shortage of things you can do or get involved in.

The teaching curriculum in Alice Springs is the same as any other urban location across the country.

Our students also participate in a whole range of innovative learning programs on top of this. We are able to incorporate the uniqueness of the land and culture of Alice Springs into the classroom experience. Your professional progression will also be identical to anywhere else in the country, one year here is equal to one year in any Australian school. The only difference may be the pace at which your career will progress. Professional roles in Alice Springs tend to take on responsibilities early and progress quickly up the career ladder.

BEFORE YOU COME

For most people, Alice Springs is a long way from home. It's a big shift to move away from family and friends, to embrace a different lifestyle and to add new experiences to your professional timeline.

It's a big decision to move anywhere new.

The rewards of moving your life and career to Alice Springs are huge. It's a place full of opportunities and adventures.

WHAT'S IT LIKE TO TEACH IN THE ALICE?

The students

Students in Alice Springs are willing to teach as well as be taught. Your class will be full of children from a huge range of different cultures who will each bring a unique story to the room. They will absorb your teaching and you will absorb theirs.

Alice kids love a challenge - they'll give anything a go. These children are resilient and enthusiastic. They know that they are a long way from their city comrades, but they don't let distance be an obstacle. Students in Alice are fully aware that through technology, they have access to every resource and that through their teachers they have access to an exciting future.

The culture

Alice Springs has strong ties to the traditional culture of the area. There is a lot of value placed on strengthening the connection to culture for future generations. There are a lot of programs and events with the purpose of bringing awareness and education to the stories of the area and why we should respect it.

While living in Alice you will learn dreaming stories, what foods you can find in the bush, the meanings of different symbols in paintings, all as part of regular life as information that you will use often. You will also learn about the strength of family bonds and admirable qualities of loyalty. All of these things will influence the way you teach, talk and act around Alice.

The lifestyle

While there is always a lot going on in Alice Springs, the pace of life here is much slower than the bigger cities of Australia. People are relaxed and things move at a pace that locals call 'Alice time.' For some, it is nice to be forced to slow down and relax, for others it takes a bit of getting used to.

Living in Alice you need to have a certain level of patience when you want things done. At the same time, it can be important to keep that 'Alice timeframe' in mind and

learn how to push for things when you need them to happen fast.

The dress code in Alice Springs suits its laid back lifestyle. There is very much an 'anything goes' vibe in the fashion sense, although you will rarely see anyone in a suit.

A lot of the activities in Alice Springs are based around the arts and the outdoors. There is a big creative culture in Alice Springs which often draws inspiration from the beautiful landscape and rich culture of the area. Things like mountain biking challenges, rock climbing, hiking, swimming in waterholes and camping are all popular activities. This connection to the outdoors and the land is a common theme
